"No one is left behind," declares Mrs Mafi. Mrs Mafi is a wife, mother, and grandmother. She lives on the eastern coast of Tonga. High tides and rising sea levels are damaging vegetable gardens. Mrs Mafi has taken action. She and the women in her community have dug new vegetable gardens on higher ground and rotated their crops so there is always food for older adults. The 2024 CWS Christmas appeal introduces us to Mrs Mafi and to the work that communities in Oceania are doing to ensure no one is left behind.

What might it mean to watch and pray for us, for our generation?

Three suggestions as we think about living in 2024/2025.

First, learning from our neighbours in Oceania. I am inspired by the example of the Anglican Church in the Solomon Islands, turning church buildings into weather stations, watching and praying. There is much to learn from how our neighbours in Oceania live their faith in the face of "restless seas."

Second, bringing faith and science together.

I like the wisdom of a scientist, Dr Adam Bobbette, now at Glasgow University, who was involved in setting up the weather stations in the Solomons. Dr Adam Bobbette commented, 'The Church was involved in observing [watching] the processes of nature in the past. [The church] has historically been a scientific institution, and this is a new dimension.' Faith and science, watching and praying in the face of 'restless seas'.

Third, to look for redemption.

Not in a straight line trying to find past, present and future, but in a "horizoned" way. Ahead and behind and all around. Where in 2024 is God's redemption drawing near? Where are we seeing love and justice? We can look practically for love and justice this week as we make space for people to be included in our communities. We can look practically for love and justice by reading about the CWS climate hope in action appeal this Christmas. In a time of restless seas, Watch and pray, for redemption is drawing near.

Sermon

Following the Sermon, we pause to discern what the Spirit is saying to the Church.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

Please remain seated as the altar party processes to the font and is joined by the candidate for baptism and his godparent.

Precentor E te whānau a te Karaiti, God is love, God gives us life. We love because God first loves us. In baptism God declares that love; in Christ God calls us to respond.

The Presentation for Baptism

The Precentor asks the candidate:

Aaron, what do you ask of God's Church?

Candidate I present myself to be baptised and made a member of the Body of Christ, the Church.

Precentor From the beginning the Church has received believers by baptism. On the day when the apostles first preached the Gospel of Christ's resurrection, Peter urged his hearers: "Repent and be baptised, every one of you, in the name of Jesus the Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is to you and to your children, and to all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God may call."

Aaron, how do you respond to this promise?

Candidate I hear God's call and ask for baptism.

The Precentor asks the candidate:

Do you renounce all evil influences and powers that rebel against God? I renounce all evil.

Do you trust in Christ's victory which brings forgiveness, freedom and life?

In faith I turn to Christ, my way, my truth, my life.

All May God keep you in the way you have chosen!

Water is poured into the baptismal font.

Precentor Praise God who made heaven and earth,

All whose promise endures forever.

Precentor We thank you God for your love in all creation, especially for your gift of water to sustain, refresh and cleanse all life. We thank you for your covenant with your people Israel; through the Red Sea waters you led them to freedom in the promised land. In the waters of the Jordan your Son was baptised by John and anointed with the Holy Spirit. Through the deep waters of death Jesus fulfilled his baptism. He died to set us free and was raised to be exalted Lord of all. It is Christ who baptises with the Holy Spirit and with fire.

All Amen. Come Holy Spirit.

Precentor We thank you that through the waters of baptism you cleanse us, renew us by your Spirit and raise us to new life. In the new covenant we are made members of your Church and share in your eternal kingdom. Through your Holy Spirit fulfil once more your promises in this water of rebirth, set apart in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

All Amen! Praise and glory and wisdom, thanksgiving and honour, power and might, be to our God forever and ever. Amen!

The Precentor baptises the candidate by pouring water on him, saying:

Aaron, I baptise you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

The Congregation responds:

Amen. God receives you by baptism into the Church. Child of God, blessed in the Spirit, welcome to the family of Christ.

With Chrism Oil, the Precentor makes the sign of the Cross on the newly baptised's forehead saying:

We sign you with the Cross, the sign of Christ.

The Affirmation

Please stand.

Precentor Praise to God who has given us life.

All Blessed be God for the gift of love.

Precentor Praise to God who forgives our sin.

All Blessed be God who sets us free.

Precentor Praise to God who kindles our faith.

All Blessed be God, our strength, our hope.

The Precentor offers the following invitation to the congregation:

Let us, the baptised, affirm that we renounce evil and commit our lives to Christ.

All respond:

Blessed be God. Jesus is Lord!

The Precentor then asks the newly baptised: What is your faith?

He responds:

I believe and trust in God the Father, maker and sustainer of all things; and in God the Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ; and in God the Holy Spirit, giver of life and truth. This is my faith.

The Precentor addresses the newly baptized:

Aaron, you are now a pilgrim with us. As a member of Christ's body, the Church, you will be challenged to affirm your faith in God and receive the laying on of hands in Confirmation. May you grow in the Holy Spirit, fulfil your ministry and follow Christ your whole life long.

Celebration of Faith

The Precentor leads the congregation in the affirming the faith of their baptism.

Precentor Do you believe in God the Father?

All I believe in God the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Precentor Do you believe in Jesus Christ the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, is seated at the right hand of the Father, and will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Precentor Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

All I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

The Prayers are lead by the liturgist.

Faithful and loving God, bless upon our newly baptised brother Aaron your blessing and grant him your gifts of love, wisdom and faith. Pour upon him your healing and reconciling love, and protect his home and loved ones from all evil. Fill him with the light of your presence and establish him in the joy of your kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

God of grace and life, in your love you have given us a place among your people; keep all of us faithful to our baptism and prepare us for that glorious day, when the whole creation will be made perfect in your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ.

Amen.

The Welcome

There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism:
Aaron, by one Spirit we are all baptised into one body.
We welcome you into the fellowship of faith;
we are children of the same heavenly Father;
we welcome you.

The newly baptised returns to his seat.

The altar party returns to their seats, while the Precentor asperges the congregation with holy water, in remembrance of their baptism.

Please stand.

The peace of Christ be always with you.

And also with you.

E te whānau, we are the body of Christ. By one Spirit we were baptised into one body.

Keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

Amen. We are bound by the love of Christ.

Please turn and acknowledge those around you by offering a greeting of Peace. During the Offertory Hymn, the bread and wine are prepared for the Eucharist. A Collection is taken at this stage.

United in Christ with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, O God, in songs of everlasting praise.


